**DUFFY SAYS:** A trip to wine country is one of my favorite getaways. There's no better experience for your palate: local wine paired with food prepared by local chefs. Before you leave, make sure to do some research about the area and how the wine fits in so you can be an informed "taster." A tasting room is where we really learn why we like a certain wine. Going through the swirling, sniffing and eventual tasting helps you understand the differences in various wines, and you have the benefit of instant feedback from the experts on why wines taste a certain way. Although I like Bordeaux and Napa Valley, I recommend trying lesser-known places, such as Walla Walla, Washington; Willamette, Oregon; Okanagan, British Columbia; or the Finger Lakes region of New York. Regardless of where you travel, a trip to wine country can turn a person from a wine drinker to a wine enthusiast.

**TIP JAR:** Pace is everything when you're tasting. Try not to plan too many winery visits in a day, and make sure to take advantage of other adventures to give yourself (and your car) a break between wineries. The last thing you want to do is end up "Sideways!"
